
Club Nights

The East Anglia Trophy!

Plans are well advanced for the EA7C led inter-club rally we are holding at Rougham Airfield near Bury St Edmunds on Sunday June 26th. Why there you may ask? Good question... The main reason we have chosen Rougham is because this is a 4-way rally which will involve all the East Anglia counties! The Essex A7C, the Suffolk Centre of the EA7C, the newly formed Norfolk A7C and the Cambridge A7C and Rougham is bang in the middle of the geographical area. It is also a particularly good venue because we will be tak-

ing part in the Rougham Wings, Wheels and Steam Day - with historic aircraft, sideshows, steam engines etc - you name it it's there! Our stand is open only to Austin Sevens and our club will be in friendly competition for the cup which was originally called the Headlamp Trophy.

So my friend John suddenly discovered he was my back-up driver. I found a bit of cord in my 'spares' and he towed me down to Brighton. It was a

case of the Toad becoming the Towed! This is not the best way to arrive at a rally of 425 plus Austin 7's stretching half a mile along the seafront, but I did get the mug and rally plaque.

Now the lapse in concentration -- instead of keeping in touch with James Tillett and his trailer team, with whom I had arranged a lift home, we went off to a restaurant where a simple bite to

I get to Barton Mills roundabout and the engine dies again but how lucky can you get as it is just by the lay-by before the roundabout. It now takes two hours at the local garage to discover that the soft metal condenser connection has fractured. With a new Japanese one fitted (I'm on 12volts) and a rather larger bill than I got from Mike Hodgson I set off for the final leg home -- car going like the clappers.

Will I do it again -- definitely, but next time I will avoid being a pain in the bum to trailer organisers. My apologies again James if you are reading this.

All of my mechanical problems came from the stress of sustained high speed driving. It is a good way of revealing any weaknesses but I certainly had my share of luck to compensate.

Charles's story leads me on to report that on latest the Austin Seven Clubs Association Committee Meeting, mention was made about "participants in the London to Brighton arriving at the final destination on the end of a tow rope", and that "breakdowns caused by faulty coils

were reported"!!!! The point was made that as we were using "old cars", there was a need to carry various spare parts that are likely to let you down. But I must admit to wondering where do you stop in the list of possible parts to carry "just in case"? The solution is to make sure that you carry a copy of the **Association's "Austin Seven Breakdown Scheme"** listing, which has been set up by Gordon Phillips. The idea is that the scheme's list has the names and contact details of Austin Seven enthusiasts, all over the UK, who are willing to help out fellow Austin Seven drivers who may be unfortunate to experience an A7 breakdown near their particular "bend of the lane. I had a chat with Gordon and he tried to send me a copy of the listing via e-mail, but we had communication problems which prevented me receiving the data, so that I could include it with this newsletter. So he has posted me a copy of the "Austin Seven Breakdown Scheme" listing, which will be available to photocopy for those who want one in the near future. For those of you who can wait, Gordon is consulting his "Confuser Guru" (namely his son!) to see how he can change the format of the list to MS Word and send it via e-mail to the various Austin Seven Clubs, for them to distribute to their members. I will let you know further information as and when it becomes available. Because of the recent **demise of MG Rover**, I thought that I had better attend the **committee meeting of the Austin Seven Clubs Association**, at Gaydon Motor Museum, on Sunday 17th April, so that I could let you know what affect this sad occurrence will have on the forthcoming **Austin Centenary Rally** at Longbridge in July.

Well the short answer is that the rally is going ahead. Howard Annett, the A7CA representative with responsibility for organising the Austin Seven portion of the rally, Reported that the close down of MG Rover will not affect the rally, apart from there being no visit to the factory or Lord Austin's office, and John Towers / MG Rover not sponsoring the Ox Roast!! So far Howard has received 310 entries for Austin Sevens and would like to receive more, so if you are planning on going please get your entry form off to Howard as soon as possible (I still have some entry forms if you want one). The event is advertised as being over three days, but Friday 8th July is setting-up day, and black-tie dinner night, with the Saturday and Sunday being the main event days. The actual rally field will be surrounded by **security** fencing and looked after by security personnel, so if you wish you can leave your Austin Seven on the rally field over night. The **camp site** (with plenty of showers and toilets) and the trailer park are inside the security area, but the "modern" car park is not. There will be four marquees in the Austin Seven section, one of which it is hoped will be licensed so that those who are camping on site will have somewhere to lubricate their larynx in the evening!! The A7CA is providing 5000 "goodies" bags for handing out over the weekend. There will be 500 special centenary **souvenir mugs** for the Austin

Seven enthusiast available on the weekend. **The Centenary Cavalcade** of 100 Austins through the years, will contain five Austin Sevens, and start at 9.30 on the Saturday morning, in Victoria Square, Birmingham, and scheduled to arrive back at the rally field before 11.00, in time arrival of the annual "Parliamentary Run", which this year starts in Westminster and ends at Longbridge (possibly a bit late for the motorhead MPs to take an interest in MG Rover I feel!). The Austin Seven paddock of the rally should be the largest which is only fitting for "The Motor of the Masses"! If you are going to the Longbridge Rally, would you please let me know?

I hope that you like the **Austin Centenary window stickers** that were designed by Graham Baldock, and distributed at the meeting. They have been road tested on the London to Brighton Run to fit in the back window of an A7 Box without totally obscuring the rear view.

Another matter that was aired at the A7CA meeting was the problem of the "stealing" of **Austin Seven registration numbers**. It seems that the DVLA is currently investigating an Austin Seven chassis number which has been claimed by two different cars, one of which it was found to have had it's chassis number ground off. So please be aware that there are some people around who are after our car numbers. If your car is off the road and registered as **SORN**, then make sure that you keep it's registering as SORN up to date otherwise you might loose the registration number. If your car was off the road before SORN came in, and therefore it is not absolutely mandatory to have it SORN registered, it might be worth considering to actually do so, so that you ensure that you keep the registration number. The other point is that you must remember to keep your SORN registration up to date, otherwise you will attract a £1,000 fine. The same goes for ordinary road fund licence of any car. It is not a very nice world at times these days. Which reminds me, I really must find a Post Office that will update the Bumble's SORN declaration (Rackheath Post Office could not do it last week!!).

I have 10 copies of **The Pre-War Austin Seven Club Special Austin Centenary Editions** of their magazine. Anyone who wants a copy please ask me.

The Closing Pleas!!

I am currently trying to find a supplier to provide us with NA7C car window stickers at a reasonable cost. If any of you can suggest a company to do this please let me know.
